1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dukhulal Nibaran Chandra College was established in 1967. With an initial objective disseminate knowledge of higher education and extracurricular activities to the rural people of Aurangabad and adjoining areas. The college was initially affiliated to Calcutta University and since the academic session 2000- 2001, it is functioning under the jurisdiction of University of Kalyani, West Bengal. The college offers a total of 18 courses including eleven Honours courses. In addition, our college offers two diploma courses and two certificate courses. Students with different learning abilities are enrolled and courses are offered to the students of different sociological and economical background. The college is committed to providing holistic education to develop individuals with integrity, emotional and mental harmony, physical capability, social awareness as well as participation in cultural activities to become upright citizens of the nation. The permanent teaching faculty strength of 77 with the principal has contributed to a successful academic atmosphere. Eight permanent and nine contractual non-teaching staff are the backbone of our institution.

Dukhulal Nibaran Chandra College has been tirelessly engaged in the creation of a long and illustrious lineage of people in various fields of life. It provides an opportunity for higher education to many students from different economic, cultural, ethnic and linguistic backgrounds. The college also aims at empowering the underprivileged section of the society by imparting quality education to rural people, poor and backward classes, and imparting skill based education. Within the framework of university prescribed curricula, the potentiality for increasing human resources within the locality is encouraged through the innovative teachings and ideals of contemporary thinkers of India.

Vision

The primary vision of Dukhulal Nibaran Chandra College is to assist in the creation of a peaceful and prosperous society through the development of educated, knowledgeable, skilled, and morally upright students.

Mission

1. To assure quality education through implementing the well-structured curriculum provided by University of Kalyani, a scheduled academic calendar, tutorial classes and continuous internal evaluation.

2. To undertake both academic and extracurricular projects with an emphasis on societal awareness in order to build the nation. To promote the holistic development of students through extracurricular activities like National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps, Excursions, Youth Parliament, Outdoor and indoor sports and games, Model Exhibition, Wall Magazine, Cultural Programs, Students' Seminar, Workshops, Group Discussion, Debate, and Quiz Competition.

3. To conduct seminars and workshops on the adoption of digital learning technologies for the Teaching, Librarian, Non-Teaching, and Sub-Staff.

4. To develop in the students a sense of environmental consciousness and health awareness.

5. To incorporate various certificate and skill development courses to bridge the gap between the curriculum and requirements for service sectors. This will provide extra knowledge to the students.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

1. The college campus consists of enough space in-between built-up areas. It has a large play ground, an auditorium, a large pond, a number of gardens of various kinds and size, along with a modernized green house cum hydroponic set up, enriched library, hygienic canteen, gymnasium and many more for source of right kind of academic ambience.

2. The faculties, non-teaching staffs and administrative personnel are widely accessible to students in order to create a homey environment within the campus.

3. Most of Faculty members are appointed by the Government of West Bengal under the recommendation of **West Bengal College Service Commission**. This ensures best quality of teaching in the institution. University rank holders, eminent researchers of reputed institutions are faculty members of some departments of the college. Along with Full Time Faculty members many State Aided College Teachers have been appointed as per instruction of Govt. of West Bengal. Combination of Associate Professor, Assistant Professor and State Aided College Teachers to ensure effective teaching, research orientation, extracurricular activities and dynamism.

4. The institution follows CBCS curriculum designed by **University of Kalyani** for undergraduate courses from academic session 2018-19. This has led to the introduction of Honours courses, Generic elective courses of different subjects with interdisciplinary approach, Program Courses, Skill enhancement courses.

5. Most of the departments of the campus are connected with a well planned LAN and internet facility is provided for faculty members and students. Wi-Fi is also provided to the students in specified zones.

6. In most of the department seminar library enriched with several text books, reference study materials and advanced study materials.

7. Departmental Laboratories are well equipped with teaching aids.

8. Fully online admission system is carried out systematically and transparently.

9. Publication of wall magazine, e-magazine, printed magazine and participation of students in Students' seminars and workshops.

10. Active engagement of Carrier counseling committee, Research and extension committee, National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps etc., in carrying out various outreach and extension programs.

11. The campus is well covered by CCTV cameras and every situation is critically monitored by respective authorities.

12. Health awareness committee of the college is very care full about physical and mental health of the students and regularly arranges health awareness programs. College authority has been appointed a medical professional for providing health check up facilities to students and all the staff of the college.

13. Partially automated and partially digitized collection of common and rare books in the library with remote access to the digital resources such as previous years question papers, syllabus, list of newly arrived books etc. to its users.

14. Majority of faculty members are actively involved in research activities. They are involved in different research projects and publish their work in reputed journals

Institutional Weakness

- Lack of sufficient classrooms and working space especially for laboratory oriented subjects.
- Shortage of faculty members in some subjects of science and arts stream.
- Shortage of technically skilled non teaching faculty members due to delay of government recruitment process. Most of the laboratory based department lack technically skilled lab attendant.
- Non-availability of funds for construction of new class rooms, repairing damaged instruments and maintenance of the existing equipment, digitalization of library and proper management of aquatic reservoir (Pond) based study center.
- Most of the students admitted to this institution belong to Bengali medium background. The greatest challenge for this institution is to impart the knowledge of communicative English to these students. The institution has applied to the competent authority to start such certificate courses.

Institutional Opportunity

1. The college offers a large number of courses and subject–combination from Arts, Commerce and Science streams to ensure horizontal flexibility in selection of course curriculum. This has become very effective with the implementation of CBCS syllabus in all programs from academic session 2018-2019.

2. Administrative body always go with low cost of education for the students. Financial help is also provided to needy students through several scholarship programs of government as well as through "Full Free" and "Half Free" scheme implemented by the administrative body of the college.

3. Departments of Botany, Department of Geography and Department of Zoology have wide opportunity for research since the college is very close to Lower Gangetic basin and the college fringe area is rich in flora and fauna.

4. Department of Physics provides the opportunity for enrolment of Certificate course on Remote Sensing conducted by **Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO).**

5. Department of Botany along with Green Campus Committee provides the opportunity for hands on training and experience on "Hydroponic Cultivation" and "Community Garden".

6. Students of some departments like Botany, Education, Geography & Zoology get the opportunity of hands on training and experience during field work and educational tours.

7. Internal Quality Assurance Cell and Carrier Counseling Committee frequently organize awareness programs about the current situation in job sector.

8. The institution involves Department of Physical Education which offers core courses for different programs under CBCS curriculum and also provides the facility of a moderately sophisticated gymnasium.

9. The institution involves a computer learning center which offers different carrier oriented AICTE approved courses.

10. NSS wing of the institution has been working on several awareness programs like Plantation, Blood donation camp, Dengue awareness program, Seminar on Women empowerment, Seminar on Mental Health etc., and Students get the opportunity to participate in it.

11. College provides a student hostel for the students come from considerable distance.

Institutional Challenge

1. Lack of funds from governmental and other non-governmental bodies for infrastructural development and for research-extension programs.

2. A large portion of the college fund is used for salary of the casual staff and maintenance of present infrastructure leaving less funds for utilizing in development purpose.

3. Fall in the employment rate discouraging the students to be in the higher education.

4. Ignorance of maintaining single e-mail ID by the students linked with their own Mobile number makes a problem for online communication and other teaching learning methods.

5. Maintenance of ecofriendly practices in the big college campus is a serious issue in the context of unawareness among the stakeholders.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Being an affiliated college, Dukhulal Nibaran Chandra College follows the curricula designed by University of Kalyani. Some of the faculty members of this college are in the Board of Studies of the university taking part in framing and modifying curricula as and when necessary.

The College ensures an efficient curriculum delivery in the following manner:

- The IQAC along with Academic Committee prepares the Annual Academic Calendar at the beginning of the academic session where the various planned activities are marked. Every year Annual Academic Calendar is printed in the form of Academic Diary for students.
- The Academic Committee in collaboration with IQAC prepares the central time table which is further modified by the departments. The time table is displayed on the department's notice board and websites.
- Syllabus is distributed among the faculties of a department and Lecture Layout is prepared by each faculty as per the need of students. Academic committee meets regularly to monitor the teaching learning process and takes remedial measures as and when necessary.
- Faculty members participated in the workshops organized by the University for designing of syllabus under CBCS system.
- College has a MOU with Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU). A unit functions from the college campus and involve active participation of some of the faculty members in academic and/or administrative activities.
- Before 2018-19 session every year "Pre-University Examination" (popularly called as Test Examination) was conducted. Since 2018-19, two Internal Examinations are conducted as per the guidelines of University.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- The college maintains transparency in the online admission process. Applications are invited online and all information is displayed on the college website for wide circulation.
- Merit lists are published online and till admission, the entire process is transparent and in the public domain.
- Admission for students from SC/ST/OBC sections is as per the State Reservation norms.
- The induction programme for the students is organized at the beginning of the academic session.
- Student mentoring is provided, counselling related to academic issues by mentors and financial problems are carefully dealt by the scholarship help desk.
- Classrooms are well-furnished, entire campus with WIFI and LAN connectivity.
- Teachers are aware of the learning outcomes of the courses being taught and prepare lesson plans accordingly. The syllabi and learning of all programmes of study are available on the college website.
- Out of the seventy two full-time teachers including the Principal. Among themthirty three are permanent and remaining are state aided college teachers (SACT).

- The college organises seminars, workshops, extracurricular activities, sporting and cultural events, field trips, extension programmes, and other events to promote participatory and experience learning.
- The departments take extra steps to finish the curriculum in the allotted time, and remedial classes are offered.
- The departmental website provides information about the subject matter of the programme and the results of the courses. The college's activities aim to provide students with a positive learning environment that will improve their prospects for the future.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- Over the past five years, the institution has hosted several seminars, workshops, and different conferences.
- A Research and Publication Cell has been established to foster creative ideas and foster a conducive environment for research.
- Numerous departments of the college organized a total of 11 seminars and 07 workshops where eminent speakers, faculty members, and students gave presentations on topics such as research methodology, eminent scientists or individuals, biophysics, astronomy, food habits and cancer, contemporary trends in chemistry, financial challenges, open source softwares, mind and memory, child marriage and its effects, tolerance in Indian societies, and applications of ICT. Additionally, departmental student lectures are planned.
- To learn about the most recent advancements in the field, the concerned departments have organized special lectures. District Science Fair, Youth Parliament, and Youth Fair were successfully organized on the college campus in collaboration with governmental and non-governmental groups to encourage students to engage in a variety of cutting-edge learning activities.
- The College publishes an international bi-annual peer-reviewed and refereed research journal named as "The DNC Journal" (ISSN-2583-5319), multi-disciplinary journal published by Research and Publication Cell, Dukhulal Nibaran Chandra College, Aurangabad.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Scope for development being infinite, the infrastructure and learning resource of the college is an ongoing process of progression.

- Construction work is in progress for extension of library building and office building. The old gallery hall is being restructured as a modernConference Hall.
- Standard facilities available in the campus are parking lot, Drinking Water, Refreshment Stall, Recreational Spaces for Boys and Girls, Grievance Redressal Intimation Box, Doctors facility, Auditorium and an open air Auditorium.
- College has an enriched library with adequate number of books, net connectivity and photocopy facilities for UG departments.
- Number of computers used for different purposes within campus is 30, photocopier 5, scanner and printer.
- A generator of 82.5 KVA capacity serves the need of the entire campus.

Student Support and Progression

- The college serves students from all segments of society and adheres to the State Government's admissions policy regarding reservation for ST, SC, OBCA, and OBCB students.
- The college is situated in a rural area and has earned an excellent reputation and goodwill from the surrounding community; enrollment of student is satisfactory.
- The pass percentage of outgoing students is high during the last five years with a significant number of first classes each year.
- The college offers a variety of student assistance programmes, such as Freeship, fee waivers, etc., under various categories. Scholarships are provided by State Government, Central Government, and non-government organizations to eligible students. Under the 'Kanyashree Prakalpa' of the Government of West Bengal, female students up to the age of 18 are given one-time support.
- The recognized Alumni Association actively contributed to the physical and intellectual expansion of the college.
- College magazine 'Ayon' is published every year giving the opportunities to the students for developing their writing skills. Teachers and ex-students also contribute their valuable articles to the college magazine. Additionally, a number of departments publish wall magazines, and digital periodicals.
- Games and sporting events such as athletic competitions, football, volleyball, and badminton competitions are held annually at the interclass level. The college organises various cultural events where intra-college competitions on co/extracurricular activities such as music, dancing, debate, and quizzes are held.
- In addition, the involvement of students in the Youth Parliament under the supervision of competent teachers contributes to the development of their personalities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The Governing Body of the college plays a crucial role in the management and growth of the institution. The Governing Body meets at regular intervals to oversee the college's operation and to launch various development programmes, as well as to approve funds for maintenance and development.
- The Academic Committee, Finance Committee, Purchase Committee, Teacher's Council, IQAC, Heads of Departments, NSS units, and a number of committees and cells comprised of Teaching Faculties, non-teaching staff, are functioning to decentralise the management in order to facilitate effective administration and efficient implementation of academic activities.
- Institutional actions are monitored and assessed through frequent meetings of IQAC and other Committees, a Feedback mechanism (Regular feedback from Stakeholders -Students, Alumnae Members and Staffs), and departmental reports by department heads.
- The institution has a system for assigning authority and granting operational autonomy. The formation of committees and cells with faculties who are qualified to oversee specific events or activities. Faculty m embers and Program Conveners/Co-Coordinators are permitted to plan and arrange academic programmes and events.
- According to government regulations, the institution has adopted various welfare measures for its employees, including PF, Cooperative Society, Earned Leave, Child Care Leave, Maternity Leave, Study Leave, and Leave for OP/RC and similar activities like seminars, conferences etc. The institution has a performance-based evaluation system for faculty. Financial audits are unblemished through 2020-21.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- The campus supports equality of opportunity for all groups, gender equity, inclusivity, and self consciousness while fostering the development of fundamental human values.
- The college performs environmental audits, energy audits, and green audits. The college campus has been rendered entirely plastic-free.
- The college has a Hydroponic system for research and extension program.
- The adoption of contemporary instruments like computers, laptops, digital technology, and electronic media with interactive activities is recommended by the teachers as a way to enhance learning.
- The academic benchmarks and exclusive practices consist of students' active participation in extension activities through the NSS units, the NCC, and the Green campus committee. The college conducted a variety of Programmes on Community Service, Extension Activities, Awareness Programmes which promote social responsibilities, leadership qualities, and citizenship roles.
- The college assures the safety and security of female students with security guards, CCTV monitoring, and a help desk specifically for female students.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The current trend in learning calls for an interdisciplinary or multidisciplinary approach, which may give students a complete understanding of education. With this goal in mind, our college's class schedule is set up in a way that makes sense and makes it possible to combine several classes to create the synchronized growth and steady learning environment that NEP 2020 calls for. The students now have a great deal of freedom to continue their studies through interdisciplinary combinations with the introduction of the CBCS syllabus in the institutions affiliated with the University of Kalyani
	in 2018. They are able to select classes based on their preferences and academic qualifications. This

	interdisciplinary pattern has not burdened them with studies but rather opened them to engaging career- oriented channels where they may move freely and deeply enjoy themselves.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	At the University of Kalyani, it is not yet in use.
3. Skill development:	In addition to continuing to offer undergraduate courses, the college also provides certificate programs in computer literacy. Regarding providing students with a value-based education, the college has made all efforts feasible. The members of the Grievance Redressal Committee and the Sexual Harassment Committee keep a constant eye on the students' righteous behavior and instill positivity in them. Regular observance of the national days such as Independence Day (15 August), Republic Day (26 January), the birth day celebrations of great sons and daughters of India, International Yoga Day, Environment Day, etc., and lectures and discussions on the significance of the above enable our students to absorb the eternal values of truth, peace, love, nonviolence, nationalism, and citizenship. Also, our NSS volunteers and NCC cadets work on community service and extension projects under the direction of their college supervisors. The goal of incorporating SEC (Skill Enhancement Course) into the CBCS curriculum is to increase individual creativity, enabling students to exercise their acquired skills and select their future means of subsistence. Regularly, the Carrier Counseling Committee organizes a number of programs that help students improve their communication skills, particularly in preparation for competitive examinations. The University of Kalyani has made a logical and convincing plan to get students to focus on skill-based creative businesses instead of the old-fashioned, traditional way of learning. Therefore, the institute has provided specialists who have excelled in their value- and skill- based indigenous projects, such as mushroom cultivation and hydroponics at the department of Botany, remote sensing at the department of Physics (in collaboration with ISRO), and communicative competency at the departments of Sanskrit and English. The goal of these courses is to provide hands- on training, competences, abilities, etc. that are based on either values or skills.

Even the program results, program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes of all courses have been posted on our college website for our students' advantage.

Distance education/online education:	The college used online learning extensively during the current COVID-19 pandemic, which lasted from the last week of March 2020 to the middle of November 2021. Our teachers performed online classes via Google Meet, Zoom, video conference, WhatsApp group, etc. Our teachers had even put study materials on the college website for students and on the departmental portal for students. It is true that many poor students who lacked the means to purchase a smart phone or laptop or who resided in distant places with poor internet connectivity had great difficulty attending online classes. These students were given special care with study materials by our teachers on a physical basis as and when required. Examinations, evaluation of answer scripts, and publication of results were all done online. In accordance with the government's instructions, college admissions were also conducted online, following the reservation policies of the government. Presently, our teachers have adopted online tools to deliver extra classes for the students beyond the working hours of the college.

The College ensures an efficient curriculum delivery in the following manner:

- The IQAC along with Academic Committee prepares the Annual Academic Calendar at the beginning of the academic session where the various planned activities are marked. Every year Annual Academic Calendar is printed in the form of Academic Diary for students.

Semester examinations for undergraduate programmes are administered in accordance with policies and guidelines of Kalyani University.

It is the University web portal through which online form fill up and generation of admit card is made.

The examination is conducted in a centre other than the home college by an examination committee comprised of the Principal and several teachers, as well as non-teaching staffs.

The examination-related difficulties are handled in a timely, transparent, and competent manner by competent personnel.

Subsequently, the answer scripts were evaluated by subject teachers in accordance with university directives.

The examinations committee addresses complaints from students regarding the exam to the best of their ability. The complaints are forwarded to the appropriate authority if necessary.

If there is a registration inconsistency, the problem is addressed to the Registrar. Concerning form filling, distribution of admit cards, marksheets, appeal for scrutiny, and re - assessment of marks, the Controller of Examinations should be contacted. In the case of a reevaluation of grades, all procedures are conducted online through the university's web portal, with the payment of the required costs.

In the event of continued dissatisfaction, the student may request a copy of the answer script under the RTI act.

In the event of internal evaluation and class tests, evaluated scripts are provided to students, reducing testrelated complaints.

The attendance record, which is part of Internal Assessment, is placed on the departmental notice board on a monthly basis by all departments, and students are given adequate chance to point out any anomalies.

Faculty of our institution uses the latest ICT tools to enhance the conventional teaching-learning process and to make learning more interesting and student-friendly. There are three technology enabled classrooms in the college, where PPT, Videos etc. are used by the teachers on regular basis to make their teaching more attractive and lively to the students.

All classrooms are Wi-Fi enabled to facilitate teachers to directly stream web pages and videos.

Printers and scanners are available in some department and in the library.

Teachers made full utilization of the Learning Management System coping with the difficulties as faced during the pandemic by distributing notes, study materials, conducting tutorials etc. even through the whatsapp study groups, college website etc.

Blended learning with the advantages of the on-line learning and traditional learning simultaneously has been emerged as a new aspect. After Covid 19 pandemic the blended mode is utilized during long holidays for remedial classes.

Teachers are allowed on-duty leave to attend faculty development programme for getting trained with the latest ICT tools.

The experienced staff members handle the examination related issues in a transparent and efficient manner within stipulated time.

Regarding internal evaluation and test examination, evaluated answer scripts are shown to the students, thus minimizing the test related grievances.

Feedback mechanism (both offline & on-line) for students, enables them to submit their grievances.

Our college has a fully automated library (KOHA) where students can easily access books and journals.

Official Youtube channel (https://youtube.com/@d.n.c.collegeofficial2669) with uploaded classes, tutorials, seminars, etc.

Faculty regularly consults and shares material from e-books, web pages, YouTube videos and other relevant resources like blogs, pages, websites etc. Some faculty members have created online digital repositories for lectures on platforms like YouTube.

There is a gymnasium where students and staff practice physical exercise regularly there under the supervision of a Gym Instructor.

Our students and employees also have access to a canteen where they can get refreshments and meals as ne eded. Four staffs prepare and serve food in a hygienic manner. Every day, it is thoroughly cleaned, and sanitation is performed every three months.

The college also has a guest room, a hostel, separate NSS, NCC, and IQAC rooms, student common rooms (01 for girls, 01 for boys and a student health centre.

Students of the college take part in cultural activities like drama, recitation, singing, and dancing on different occasions, such as Independence Day, Republic Day, International Language Day, Teacher's Day, College Foundation Day and the birthdays of famous people like Rabindranath Tagore, Kazi Nazrul Islam, Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose, Swami Vivekananda, Mahatma Gandhi, Pandit Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar, etc.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

- The entire college is covered by 26 CCTV cameras, which are monitored from the office of the principal. The record is preserved for future reference for 25 days. The Principal is also able to watch CCTV camera footage from anyplace.

Administrative setup

Dukhulal Nibaran Chandra College is affiliated to University of Kalyani, West Bengal. The head of the institution is the Principal-in- Charge. He is assisted by the IQAC, Academic Committee, Finance Committee, Purchase Committee, and various subcommittees of the Teachers' Council. The Governing Body is the apex body of the college. The college administration governed by the West Bengal Universities and Colleges (Administration and Regulation) Act,2017, and University of Kalyani statutes. The Governing Body consists of Government nominated President, Principal acting as Secretary of the Body, two Government nominees, two University nominees, three elected Teachers' Representatives, one elected non-Teaching Staff's Representative. There is provision for a Nominee of the Higher Education Department of the Govt. of West Bengal, a nominee from Donors and a student representative. Matters related to staff welfare, their appointments, sanctioning of leave (above 15 days), their retirements, approaching the higher authorities to fill up the vacant posts etc., are considered by the college Governing Body.

Recruitment and Promotional Policies

The West Bengal College Service Commission recruits the teaching faculties. The Commission makes

recommendations for the names of faculty to be appointed in the college, and the Governing Body acts on such recommendations. Newly appointed faculties have a one-year probationary term. Their promotion is based on the period of service and the API score. The State-aided College Teachers (SACT) are appointed by the college through interviews by the Expert Committees and duly approved by the governing body of the college. The state govt. after being satisfied with the transparency of the recruitment process approves of their SACT status. On completion of M. Phil, Ph. D. or qualifying in the NET/SET examinations there are rewards for them in the form of an incremental increase in their remunerations. The yearly increment for their service is also in place. The non-Teaching staffs are recruited by the college authority. The posts that have prior sanction and clearance from the govt. of West Bengal are filled up transparently by the Governing Body through an expert committee. Then the state government after being satisfied with the transparency of the process of recruitment approves the selected candidates and issues pay fixation. The probationary period for them is one year. The college also recruits non-teaching staff considering the increase in workload. These staffs are recruited on a temporary basis. Although they do not enjoy the benefits of yearly increments in remunerations, their remunerations have increased several times during the last five years.

All the service rules related to leave, promotion, and retirement benefits are guided by the Govt. of West Bengal. Regarding procedure of payments of salaries of staff, the grant-in-aid pay-packet system as sanctioned by the DPI, West Bengal is mediated through the respective treasuries and deposited to individual bank account through HRMS portal of the Govt. of West Bengal.

The administrative system of the college in respect of office works, admission, library works, has been partially digitized i.e. made through on-line mode.

Response:

The IQAC has made a contribution by improving coordination and communication with departmental heads at the start of every academic session to coordinate work allocations of teachers. This is done so that teachers with specialised skills are optimally utilised for tasks in other departments as well, beyond their departmental obligations, to benefit students in those departments as well.

The IQAC made a concerted effort to encourage teachers to regularly upgrade their teaching approaches and abilities in response to changing circumstances. In a pandemic situation, the implementation of e-teaching-learning-and-evaluation processes enhance the quality of knowledge management of the students. Despite its rural location, the college has upgraded its infrastructure and provided encouragement and training to teachers so that they can upgrade themselves for the use of many such tools for educating students. The IQAC works hard to coordinate such activities in order to improve the teaching-learning process and interdepartmental cooperation. Implementation of e-teaching-learning and evaluation processes through the use of cutting-edge ICT tools and teaching aids.

It has been noted that the majority of newly admitted students are worried and uncertain about their topic choices for honours and programme courses, as well as the future prospects of the subjects. To assist them in this regard, beginning in 2018-19, an initiative has been launched to offer orientation programmes for each department each year. In this programme, the principal, IQAC coordinator, and departmental teachers provide inspirational lectures to inspire students to study their respective subjects with full passion, devotion, and love.

Institutional Best Practice -1

Title of the Practice- Inclusive Teaching Environment

Objective: As the majority of the student population resides in rural areas and is underprivileged, it is important to reach out to as many first-generation students as possible. With these considerations in mind, our major objective is to provide low-cost options for higher education, skill-based training, and equip students with the technological skills necessary to adapt to contemporary learning methods.

Context: Education is a light that points humanity in the correct direction. The goal of education is to instill logical thinking and self reliance in students, not only to make them read. The conventional teaching practise has been upgraded with the help of digital platforms in this pandemic situation, and skilled-based courses have been strengthened, all with the goal of serving the new generation of youth in the areas surrounding the college, which was built on the blood, sweat and land of local villagers. There is no alternative way to take education to new heights in the present era without the intervention of technology, and e-learning is especially important for youths to obtain a competitive advantage.

Practice: Our college is located in a rural, underdeveloped region where the majority of the population depends on agriculture or biri factory, a significant portion of the population comes from social and economically deprived backgrounds, and a significant proportion of our students are first-generation learners. In light of these considerations, our primary objective and challenge is to provide our students with access to Higher Education at the lowest possible cost, to provide them with skill-based training, and to upgrade them by teaching them soft skills and basic computer proficiency. To lower the dropout rate, which occurs for a number of reasons, a mental boost and financial assistance are provided. E-Learning also contributed to the improvement of quality in each department, as faculty members shared information and data via social media such as Whatsapp, websites, and YouTube channels, resulting in innovative teaching techniques, new ways of learning and interacting, and the simple exchange of ideas.

Evidence of Success: Communication and Goodwill of the institution have played a crucial role in promoting widespread recognition through this inclusive teaching environment.

• As the sharing of ideas through e-learning methods became efficient at low marginal cost, teaching learning or student-teacher contact became a 24×7 event outside of a traditional classroom. Students have been allowed to maintain direct contact with their teachers in order to receive regular

updates on their classes and for other academic goals. Notwithstanding obstacles caused by the epidemic, all students were able to take their exams with no dropouts.

- E-knowledge has opened up new vistas for students and faculty alike, providing flexibility of learning experience, better access to information, and encouraging innovative and effective ways of learning as evidenced in project and class assignment preparation.
- The active engagement of college students in workshops, seminars, debates, etc. has become a common occurrence, sparking a renewed desire to study and share ideas among the student body.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The enhanced digital learning could not be accessed by or offered to every students dwelling in distant areas. Individual student monitoring systems must be carefully maintained.

Institutional Best Practice -2

Title of the Practice- Promotion of Sustainable Environment in College Campus

Objective: Environmental sustainability is crucial in view of accelerating environmental degradation, and it can be achieved by the application of eco-friendly practises.

Context: A clean and lively environment is beneficial to learning and promotes successful learning. A green campus drive is a programme that helps to safeguard the environment at a specific location. There are multiple efforts to address the various environmental education challenges. Green audit is the most efficient and environmentally friendly technique to manage environmental issues. It is the obligation of each individual to provide professional care that takes into account economic, financial, social, and environmental factors.

Practice: Our institution is devoted to establishing an eco-friendly and sustainable campus. Instilling the importance of environmental preservation and environmental sustainability in the students and faculty through the implementation of the following measures:

• The Faculties and College students collaborated to preserve the Green Campus within the College.

- There is a designated parking spot at the main gate; vehicle movement and parking on the main campus and play ground are banned.
- Since the campus is so close to the Ganga River, it is rich in flora and fauna. The college features a large pond with a diverse aquatic flora and fauna.
- An on-site hydroponic garden including over fifty varieties of crop plants promotes a healthy environment in the campus.
- Significant days, such as World Environment Day and World Ozone Day, are celebrated through plantation programmes, processions with placards and banners, etc., to promote environmental protection and conservation awareness.
- The Green Campus Committee and Department of Environmental Science have declared the entire campus as "No Plastic Zone."
- Regularly, non-biodegradable, electrical, and hazardous materials are discarded.

Evidence of Success:

- We were able to raise awareness about the environment and the importance of sustainability among our college's employees and students. During various campaigns, our students have received public praise; many have committed to use resources properly and to make every effort to protect and conserve the environment.
- On and around campus, trees are planted and maintained to.
- In order to preserve natural flora and fauna, ecological succession is maintained in the pond. Human-made disturbances are prohibited there.
- The College has been designated a "No Plastic Zone."
- Wastes are disposed of in a systematic manner.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The primary obstacle to accomplishing this initiative is the absence of a desire to assume social and environmental responsibilities. Hence, there is a need for widespread knowledge among college students, who may then disseminate the message to all segments of society. Transitioning to sustainable green campus is a costly endeavour that requires government support and participation in the form of financial aid and subsidies.
